



## Minnesota 2010 Physical Education Standards with Sample Benchmarks and Activities

### Minnesota Statute, Section 120B.021

In 2010, the Minnesota Legislature adopted the 2004 National Association of Sport and Physical Education Standards as the state physical education standards. School districts are required to adopt these standards by the 2012-13 school year and develop their own grade-level benchmarks, curriculum and assessments to meet those standards

### Minnesota 2010 Physical Education Standards

1. A physically educated person demonstrates competency in motor skills and movement patterns needed to perform a variety of physical activities.
2. A physically education person demonstrates understanding of movement concepts, principles, strategies, and tactics as they apply to learning and performance activities.
3. A physically educated person participates regularly in physical activity.
4. A physically educated person achieves and maintains a health-enhancing level of fitness.
5. A physically educated person exhibits responsible personal and social behavior that respects self and others in physical activity settings.
6. A physically educated person values physical activity, health, enjoyment, challenge, self-expression, and/or social interaction.

### Sample Physical Education Benchmarks and Activities

This document provides sample benchmarks and activities to meet the standards. They were developed by the Health and Physical Education Quality Teaching Network to provide ideas for sample benchmarks and activities for schools developing their programming to meet the state required standards. Teachers can use samples as they are, or modify them to fit a curriculum.

### Physical Education Requirements

All students in Minnesota in kindergarten through grade eight are required to participate in physical education every year. High school students must participate at least once. The amount of time, credit and graduation requirement is determined at the district level.
